It's Not Too Late to Learn English!

The desire to learn can come at any age, and turning that desire into action can change your life. Miryam Palacio of North Port is proof.

She came to the U.S. from Colombia more than 30 years ago with her husband and daughter. They settled in New York where Miryam had family. Both parents soon found jobs, began working, built a life for themselves and had two more daughters. And 30 years raced by.

For all of those years, Miryam was like thousands of Spanish-speaking immigrants who come to America but don't learn English. She worked in the New York garment industry and says, "It was easy back then. So many people spoke Spanish. I didn't have to learn English to work. I had my family, my relatives and my neighbors. We all spoke Spanish."

Life was made easier yet because Miryam's husband worked in an English-speaking business and he learned the language. He knew enough English for their family to build a normal life in America and for Miryam to continue speaking only Spanish. Today, her three daughters -- all grown, and all fluent in English, of course -- also speak Spanish because the family spoke Spanish at home. "I'm very proud of them for speaking two languages," says Miryam.

Two years ago, everything changed when the Palacios moved to Florida. Suddenly, there was year-round warm weather, lots to do, and not so many Spanish-speaking relatives. It was then Miryam became curious about language: Could she possibly learn to speak English here in Florida? Was it too late? Would she be able to study and remember? Who would help her? And most importantly -- how exactly would she accomplish all this?

Undoubtedly, it was fate. At the North Port Library, Miryam was introduced to Karen Bridegam who introduced her to Literacy Volunteers, interviewed her as a student and matched her with tutor Gail Gursky. Today, after 30-plus years in America, Miryam Palacio speaks English -- and loves it. She beams with pride.

Gail tutors Miryam weekly at the library, and Miryam also faithfully attends two classes taught by Mary Seyler and Jan Gallas. "It's hard at my age," she says. "Pronunciation is hard. I don't always understand everything people say. It's hard to remember new words, too. But I keep trying every day. I won't give up."

Gail Gursky won't let her give up. They use Voyager and Endeavor, and are major users of Duolingo online. Gail comes from New York too, but has lived in Florida for 27 years. She was trained to tutor in 2015, and says, "I have always wanted to do this, for as long as I can remember.

Because he understood Russian, that was the language we used for computer translations. There was no translation program for Armenian, an ancient language that uses a unique alphabet.

Harry learned faster than we ever imagined. Within a few months he was using humorous idioms and making jokes in English. He not only learned to speak English very quickly but could read and write within a year (although his spelling is still interesting). Harry passed his driver's test, obtained a green card, married an American girl, held a full time job as a handyman for a hotel and purchased his own car. Recently Harry attended truck driving school, finishing first in his class and now he drives an 18 wheeler around the country. While he is earning a great salary he is seeing his beloved America.

Another Student Success Story - We'd Like to Print Yours

Lorenzo is a man in his 30s who moved to the United States from Puerto Rico. He was taught English throughout his school years and felt confident that he would not have a problem with the language. Much to his surprise, he did need assistance in improving his language skills. He had several years experience in the medical field, but started working in Venice Regional Bayfront Medical Center at an entry level position until he could pass a test which turned out to be a huge challenge. He was able to read the questions, but he could not determine what exactly was being asked and how he should answer the questions. He worked with an LVSSC tutor until he felt confident enough to take the test again.

The second time he took the test, he passed and was immediately given a higher position and a raise of \$14 per hour. Having accomplished his goal, he decided he did not require the help of a tutor any longer.

LVSSC Helps Employees of Local Restaurant Learn English

Our organization has always been interested in working with groups who are employed by local businesses. For this reason Sid Shrauger, ESL tutor and former Board member, was very proactive when he learned that a Venice restaurant had employees who need help with English. He made arrangements with the business owner and soon after tutor Irma Arroyo stepped up to the plate and began very elementary classes with 5-7 students.

The number of students varies from week to week. The students come to work 1 1/2 hours early to meet with Irma and study basic vocabulary, pronunciation, reading and writing. Since the students don't have strong reading and writing skills in their native language, the job is especially challenging. Most of Irma's students worked on farms and only went to school as a child for a short time. Their Spanish is rustic which makes translation more difficult. To their benefit they are all fairly young which usually makes learning language easier.

This model can be used for other businesses as long as management is supportive and the students are willing to try. Emphasis in language related to the job appeals to management as does help with acculturating to American life style and conduct.

2016 Giving Challenge "24 Hours of Online Suspense"



On September 21 and 22 we participated in this year's Giving Challenge, one of 527 organizations all competing for donations.

The Challenge began with a 2-hour workshop in late June for team leaders. The presentation outlined this year's Challenge Rules and discussed various ways that organizations could increase their donations.


The Giving Challenge was an exciting 24-hour online giving event supporting more than 500 nonprofits serving Sarasota, Manatee, Charlotte and Desoto counties. The 2016 Giving Challenge was presented by the Community Foundation of Sarasota County with giving strengthened by The Patterson Foundation, as well as support from other organizations. This year's theme was "Be The One" and through the generosity of the Patterson Foundation all donations from New donors were matched 2 to 1 and all Repeat donations were matched 1 to 1 up to \$100, so we had an opportunity to truly expand our donations if we could turn out the donors!

The efforts by Board members to solicit tutors, LVSSC members, friends, relatives, and acquaintances via e-mail, Facebook, Twitter, and face to face requests was successful beyond our expectations. We raised \$4,930 in donations and \$8,035 in matching funds for a grand total of \$12,965. We had one donation of \$500, 18 of \$100, 18 of \$50, and 15 donated \$25.

Dear LitWits...

Question: I have begun work with a young student who has been in Venice for about a year working with several others from his home country in Latin America. He is at Level 0 in English and has almost no reading and writing skills in Spanish. Even his Spanish is very rustic. He wants to learn English to get a driver's license and get a better job. Where do I start?

Answer: Laubach Way to <u>English</u> (LWE) is a series of Teacher's Guides designed for teaching ESL particularly to functionally illiterate adults. These guides walk tutors and their students through a beginning English program in listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills. Each guide begins with lessons in conversation skills that prepare the student for a *Laubach Way to <u>Reading</u>* (LWR) book at the same level. Also, there are Free Resources on the New Readers Press web site to download including illustrations that correspond to the Level 1-3 LWE books and the *Laubach Way to English Tutor Workshop Handbook*. The Handbook includes instructions for teaching Level 0 ESL students.

Take English to the Next Level - Academic English at SCF

Is college a goal for your student? State College of Florida, Venice Campus, can help your student pursue his or her dreams! Students who have reached at least an intermediate level of English ability may qualify for SCF's English for Academic Purposes (EAP) program. Located at 8000 S. Tamiami Trail, mid-way between North Port and Venice, State College of Florida offers intermediate and advanced classes in Grammar and Writing, as well as Reading and Speaking.

The goal of the EAP program is to help students cross the bridge from everyday English to the higher level, academic English needed for college success, with a focus on critical reading, essay writing, making academic presentations, developing note-taking skills and increasing academic vocabulary. As students improve their English, college instructors and advisors will assist them to move seamlessly from the EAP program to a pathway for a professional career in one of many possible areas of study at the College.

To participate in the EAP program, a student must apply to the College, which includes completing forms and providing documentation. The next semester begins in January, and interested students should begin the inquiry and application process as early as possible in order to meet all deadlines, as this process can often take over a month.

Many EAP students qualify for Financial Aid, which covers some or all tuition costs. Additionally, SCF offers a convenient monthly payment plan to spread the tuition cost across the semester.

Students who may qualify for State College of Florida:

- Are permanent residents of the U.S. (Green Card holder) or U. S. citizens
- Have a Social Security number
- Are high school graduates from any country AND have access to their original diploma and transcript

If your student would like to learn more about the English for Academic Purposes program at SCF and begin the application process, the student may contact Maria Spelleri at spellem@scf.edu (preferred) or (941) 408-1505. A face-to- face appointment can also be arranged. If your student isn't sure of his or her level, a quick evaluation of a writing sample can be completed at that time.
