Several tutors and some students live in that area, so it made sense to Pam for the neighborhood to support LVSSC. She solicited donations from community businesses for the raffle. Golden Beach board members also contributed gifts for the raffle. Finally, Pam worked the day of the raffle selling tickets. She was joined by

Nancy Pike, LVSSC Vice President, who is also a Golden Beacher. Thank you, Golden Beach neighborhood and especially Pam Marble! 
The renovation is estimated to cost \$250,000 and will be completed within the next few months. As most of you know, LVSSC depends on the Sarasota County

Dear LitWits

In each newsletter we will publish an answer to a question from a tutor, instructor or member submitted to local-verizon.net (place "LitWits" in the subject line). LitWits will delve into local brains and widespread research to answer your questions about the Literacy Volunteers organization, questions about tutoring or instructing adult learners.

Question: What would you recommend as a fun activity to give my student a break from book work that would also increase her vocabulary and improve her spelling?

Answer: Many adult literacy tutors play Bananagrams with their students. This game consists of 144 letter tiles in a yellow banana shaped zippered bag. Using Bananagrams will help your student learn and recall the correct spelling of words. You can play according to the instructions or create your own variations. It's beneficial for students to be able to manipulate the letter tiles to form words. This kinesthetic learning approach helps learners see and feel the words they are spelling.
