Tutor and Student Learn from Each Other



Allan Metzler came to Florida in 2014 after a long career with a telephone company in Maine. He became a Literacy Volunteers tutor five years ago, and for most of that time he has tutored Oksana Pogribna who is from Ukraine. They have made impressive progress. Allan and his wife Deb considered becoming tutors for several months before they inquired about tutor training. When they completed the training, Allan didn't believe he could teach English as a Second Language (ESL); he felt unprepared. Many of us experience that feeling when we first start out. However soon after Allan began meeting with Oksana, everything fell into place. He assessed her language needs and prepared lesson plans.

Oksana came to the United States six years ago, and for a short time she lived in Colorado. She came to Florida with her husband and daughter, looking for warmer weather. Oksana's husband is now a cross-country truck driver, and according to Oksana, he is a guest in his own home.

Oksana was a hair stylist in Ukraine. The stiff competition for a seat in beauty school in this area prevents her from attending now. Also, her twelve-year-old daughter needs her at home after school. So, Oksana has not attended a professional school since coming here, but she has accomplished so much by learning English. She is easily understood, and one can tell by her responses that she misses very little in conversation. She is hesitant to use words she recently learned for fear of making a mistake. She needs to practice with her tutor to have confidence using words that are new to her.

Oksana was a good student, and Allan was eager to help her. They discovered that they both love photography. On that subject, Oksana is the tutor and Allan is the student. And so, Oksana learns more English each week while helping Allan with photography.

After their working together for almost five years, it is so nice to hear Oksana's conversation. She has a lovely accent and a good vocabulary. She corrects herself on tense and parts of speech. Oksana also attends Literacy Volunteers ESL conversation classes and continues to be a dedicated one-to-one student.

Students and Tutors at the Annual Meeting Luncheon

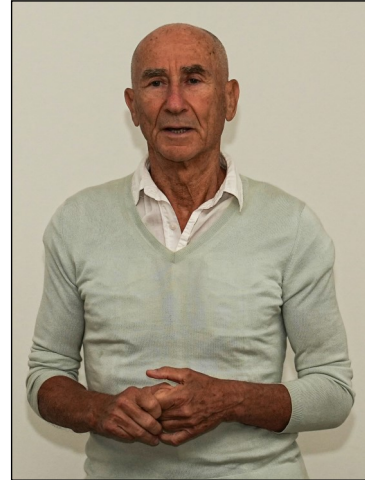

Digital Tablets and WiFi Hot Spot Devices



Two grants from The Plantation Community Foundation have provided the funds to provide Samsung digital tablets and Hot Spot devices to our students who don't have regular access to the internet with a computer. Our goal is to be certain that our students can use all the tools available, in addition to their tutors, so they can quickly become fluent in reading, writing, and speaking English. It has taken some time to establish the criteria for lending these, but they are now ready and available to established students who need them. And remember, students can register for and use them for Learning Upgrade, an online collection of over 49 courses.

English Lessons and Dancing Lessons

The Fred Astaire Studio in Venice has a group of dance instructors who needed our help to improve their English. Tutors Irma Arroyo, Joe Giorgianni, and Donna Sweet are helping these instructors with support from Peter Norrman, Venice Coordinator. 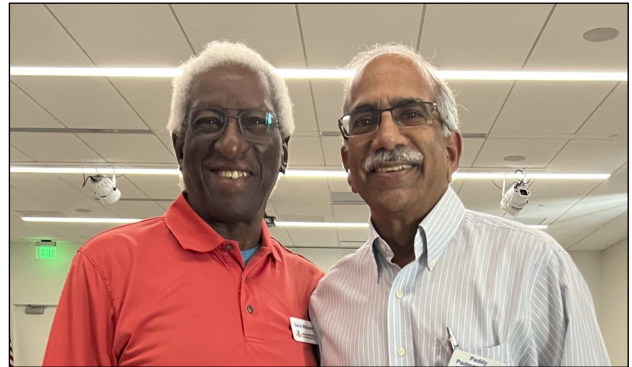
