Maryna, her husband and their two-year-old son arrived in North Port five years ago from Belarus to join her brother who has lived here for twenty years after he won a green card lottery. While Maryna was still in her home country, her brother advised her to continue to study English. She had started learning English in first grade and continued to study through evening classes while attending University. However, even with this foundation in English, she felt like she "did not know anything" when she arrived.

In Belarus, Maryna was a teacher of Biology and Geography for seven years and was a vice principal for four years. She knew that she wanted to also teach here, but she also knew that her English needed to drastically improve. Her brother told her about the literacy program at the library and she enrolled. Right away she was assigned a tutor and started taking classes. Maryna felt her progress was too slow so she decided that to learn English, she needed to surround herself with English. She started to volunteer at the Kindergarten Prep School in North Port. Shortly thereafter, she became a teaching assistant, but her work schedule conflicted with her tutor's availability. She requested a new tutor, and that is when she started to work with Pat Teskey.

Pat, a retired English as a Second Language Teacher, who spends four-five months each winter in the area, started working with Maryna. They really clicked! Pat was excited to work with such an extremely motivated student. Pat loves teaching and learning about the various countries that her students have come from. They work mostly via Zoom because it provides flexibility of scheduling that works for them even when Pat is in Florida. Pat shares that Maryna works hard, always does her homework and assigned practice. She is very proud of the outstanding

strides that Maryna has made. Presently, they work with Easy English News and sometimes actual news articles or as Maryna says, "hard news articles".

Maryna was first able to become a teacher at the Kindergarten Prep School. She then took the required proficiency tests in Developmental Knowledge, English, Math, and Science and is now qualified for temporary teacher licensure for pre-school through third grade here in Florida. Congratulations are in order for Maryna. Over this past summer, she became employed as a third-grade teacher at the Lamarque Elementary School in North Port.

At this point, Maryna wants to continue to increase her vocabulary. She says she learns new English words when she hears the word in context, translates it and then memorizes it. One of the things she loves the most about Pat is that Pat has always corrected her speech and had her go back and repeat it correctly. Learning the accepted way to use articles in English has been a struggle, but Pat has been insistent and Maryna has, with much concentration and practice, mastered this challenge.

Maryna believes that it was vitally important for her to volunteer and work in an English-speaking environment to really master the language. Pat believes that students who are as dedicated and motivated as Maryna are a joy to work with and will make great strides in their learning.

Denise Gastineau: Retired Tutor Trainer

Last spring in a conference room in the Venice Library, Denise welcomed her class of seven eager tutors in training. This was the second in a sequence of three half days of training for this particular class.

Posted on the wall of her classroom was the goal of the tutor training course, which is to provide the tutor with the strategies, resources and background necessary to tutor an adult in the skills of reading, writing, and speaking English.

In her class that day, with ease and insight, she presented materials from the "Lit Start" book covering speaking, reading, word study, and writing strategies. Additionally, she and the class discussed American cultural norms compared with those of other countries.

As with all our training sessions, the students in her class were eager to get matched with a student and implement their new learnings tutoring.

Revised Tutor Training Workshops

We are excited to announce that we have developed a new and improved New Tutor Training Workshop. It was developed by Trish Roberts, Sue Spayd, and members from our Tutor Training Development Committee. The new training was débuted in July of 2023 at the United Way of South Sarasota County offices. Carolyn Pearce, who attended training in May, 2023, also attended our New Training Workshop in July and was very impressed and felt like she gained many tools to become a more effective tutor.

The new training is a two-day workshop that promotes discussion and many interactive activities within the new format. Attendees are able to get acquainted with each other and share ideas. This new training concept allows for cohort groups where attendees can stay in touch and communicate with each other after training.

Training will be offered every other month (six times/year) moving forward. In addition to United Way of South Sarasota County hosting our workshops, we are also partnering with State College of Florida of Venice (SCF), which has agreed to host future workshops. SCF is a location closer to North Port and may be more convenient for our North Port area tutors. We are very fortunate to have both United Way and SCF, offer space free of charge to our organization.

Take English to the Next Level- Academic English at SCF

Is college a goal for your student? State College of Florida, Venice Campus, can help your student pursue his or her dreams! Students who have reached at least an intermediate level of English ability may qualify for SCF's English for Academic Purposes (EAP) program. Located at 8000 S. Tamiami Trail, mid-way between North Port and Venice, State College of Florida offers intermediate and advanced classes in Grammar and Writing, as well as Reading and Speaking.

The goal of the EAP program is to help students cross the bridge from everyday English to the higher level, academic English needed for college success, with a focus on critical reading, accurate writing, advanced vocabulary, and clarity in speaking. EAP courses also work well for those who don't have college plans but want to step up their professional communication skills.

To participate in the EAP program, a student must apply to the College, which includes completing forms and providing documentation. Semesters begin in January and August. Interested students should begin the inquiry and application process as early as possible in order to meet all deadlines, as this process usually takes more than one month.

Many EAP students qualify for Financial Aid, which covers some or all tuition costs. If not, SCF offers a convenient payment plan to spread the tuition cost across the semester.

Students who may qualify for State College of Florida:

- Have a Social Security number
- Are high school graduates from any country AND have a copy of their original diploma and transcript
- Are not tourists on a tourist visa. (SCF accepts many different kinds of visas, including Parolee and Refugee. Be sure to inquire.)

If your student would like to learn more about the English for Academic Purposes program at SCF and begin the application process, you or your student may contact Maria Spelleri at spellem@scf.edu. A face-to-face appointment can also be arranged. If your student isn't sure of his or her level, a quick evaluation of a writing sample can be completed at that time.

October Tutor Luncheon

Sue Spayd, Executive Director, welcomed Board of Director members and tutors. She enthusiastically reminded the tutors that they are a rare and valued resource to the organization. Sue shared that the demand for services has increased 60% over the last two years.



Going forward, the current primary format of one-on-one tutoring will continue to grow as more tutors become available. Additionally, we want to encourage more tutors to become small group class instructors. Small group classes are a very effective model for providing instruction to English language learners and will provide increased opportunities for the well more than 100 students waiting for services. Sue also promoted ongoing professional development opportunities for tutors/instructors through ProLiteracy. Tutors were asked to consider becoming a monitor for students participating in the smartphone-based app "Learning Upgrade". This is an individualized self-paced and comprehensive approach to English instruction. Student participants are required to participate online a minimum of 2-3 hours weekly. This online resource is a chance for students to receive instruction when one on one tutors are not available, students lack transportation, or students are inconsistently available for regular lessons. To maximize the potential of this program, we need tutors who are willing to monitor



student progress and occasionally provide additional support. Please contact Peter or Karen if you are interested in setting up a small class or monitoring Learning Upgrade students.

These topics included: the importance of establishing an agreed upon calendar of sessions with your student, the value of creating personal connections, helping students get a library card and introducing them to library services, i.e., recorded books, importance of picture dictionaries, dictionary apps and apps that pronounce words, and having students log/journal their accomplishment and experiences past or present.

In conclusion, as always tutors were encouraged to reach out to friends, neighbors and folks they know to encourage them to join in our important mission. The next tutor training sessions will be held on Nov. 15 and 17 from 9-4. Following this session, training will be offered again after the upcoming holidays.

As you get this newsletter, here we are in November, the fifth month of our 2023/2024 fiscal year. It has been a very busy and challenging year. As expected, we are experiencing a higher demand than ever for our services, specifically in the North Port area due to the high influx of immigrants from Ukraine and Russia. I want to express my thanks to all of our tutors, instructors, and volunteers. We are doing our best to serve all the students who approach us to improve their literacy skills.

As you may know, we have a new tutor trainer in Patricia (Trish) Roberts. She is a highly experienced retired teacher and a committed board member. Trish has revamped the training program to ensure that the training is meaningful, interactive, and provides the skills and tools needed to become an effective tutor. Our previous trainers, Denise Gastineau and Lavonne Radonovich, did a magnificent job for a very long time in training many of our current tutors. Their years of service and dedication to our organization are very much appreciated.

As we move forward, it is our objective to ensure that we accommodate all the students requiring our services. As most of our students fall somewhere between Level Zero and Level Three, we are working on providing more group classes (class size determined by the tutor and availability of students in the similar category) as opposed to individual/one on one tutoring for these students. The board arrived at this decision based on the evidence that people at these levels learn better in a group setting and that we can better accommodate our student's needs. We fully understand that this could pose some challenges in terms of availability of spaces to conduct group classes. Our energetic Executive Director, Sue Spayd, is working hard to find solutions. If you have ideas and suggestions, please share them with Sue as it is a challenging proposition. Sue needs all our help. For example, if you are very active in a place of worship, please check to see if we could use a space within their building to conduct our classes.

Tutors! Tutors! Yes, we need more tutors. As you socialize with your friends and family during the coming holiday season, please keep an eye out to recruit new volunteer tutors and/or small group instructors.

Teaching Tips: Pronunciation, Fluency, and Comprehension

When introducing a new text to a student it is a good idea to pre-teach vocabulary by introducing new or words that you anticipate will be difficult words for them to understand or pronounce. It is also important to provide multiple opportunities for the student to pronounce these challenging words.

Tutors can teach their students how to use technology to enhance their pronunciation. Search in Google for: **how to pronounce** (insert the word you want to hear). This site will pronounce the word, record the student saying the word, and offer suggestions for improvement in pronouncing the word.

To increase fluency and comprehension, the first reading of a passage should be read aloud by the teacher reading with expression, modeling pronunciation and fluency. This reading should be followed by the student reading the text and responding to tasks that encourage them to return to the text and identify the evidence for their answers. Providing tasks that require the student to reread the text multiple times is very beneficial for developing reading fluency and comprehension.
