Letters From *бабушка*

In the former USSR, Tamara and Ben had been devout Evangelical Christians, but that was always dangerous. Their pastor was often jailed, and the church they worshipped in was often attacked because only the Russian Orthodox Church was authorized. Their involvement with the Evangelical Church was risky. In addition, Ben was an engineering student, a member of a peace movement, and could not espouse Communism. He was identified to the KGB while taking a required course on Communism. They were forced to leave.

Tamara and Ben provide us with a wonderful story about overcoming the frightening obstacles in their former lives in the former USSR. This couple and their 4 small children came from suburban Moscow 31 years ago. They were required to leave everything they owned behind, or Ben would be imprisoned. They were each allowed to take Russian rubles equivalent to \$90 with them.

When they arrived in Massachusetts the couple was helped by a local church group. They lived in a town where there is a large Russian and Ukrainian population. Ben found work as an electrician's helper and Tamara worked nights in an envelope factory where she found companionship with others who spoke her language. Eventually, Tamara was offered a job as a teacher's aide in a school that had many very young children who spoke no English.



Tamara read to the children and translated the stories. In the process, she learned English. This is quite a feat considering that her native script is Cyrillic! While in Massachusetts, they both attended citizenship classes, became proud Americans, and raised four successful well-educated children.

Today, Tamara and Ben are retired, speak fairly good English and live in North Port where there is a large Russian and Ukrainian bilingual population. They are improving their English skills with LVSSC tutors Walt Koenig and Allisson Kirk. Ben wants to achieve better pronunciation and Tamara wants to write to her grandchildren using proper English.

Translation: **бабушка** means Grandma



Academic English at SCF

Is your student interested in attending college? August seems a long way off, but now is the time to let your intermediate or advanced student know about opportunities at State College of Florida for next semester. The local campus at 8000 S. Tamiami Trail is just a mile north of River Road. The English for Academic Purposes (EAP) program can help your student move on to the next step in English language studies. Small classes, day and evening hours, a focus on grammar, writing, and college reading and discussion skills make the program unique in the area.

Instructors, advisors, and a Career Resource Center assist students to move seamlessly from the English program to a degree pathway in the College. EAP is great both for students who want to attend college for the first time, and for those who are college graduates from another country and want to pursue a new area of study or look into transferring their degrees.

Who can attend? The EAP program follows the same policies as other college programs. The applicant should have a high school diploma (from any country) and be living permanently in the United States. The program consists of levels 3-6, so it isn't for absolute beginners. The application process and high school diploma evaluation can sometimes take more than a month, which is why interested students shouldn't delay getting answers to their questions.

The Venice Campus of SCF offers a one-on-one service to help prospective students through the process of gathering information and applying to the College. The EAP Curriculum Coordinator, Professor Maria Spelleri, is happy to meet with any inquiring student (and tutor!) to explain how the program works, what the college offers, and how a student can apply both to the college and for federal financial aid. Also, she can informally assess your student's level to determine if the student is ready for EAP. Contact her before mid-May, when summer vacation starts.



LVSSC AT THE VENICE BOOK FAIR IN MARCH


The 8th Annual Venice Book Fair and Writers festival will take place Friday and Saturday, March 15 and 16, and Literacy Volunteers will be there!

Come to an Orientation

Several months ago, we began to conduct orientation sessions for those who are interested in becoming LVSSC tutors. Beginning in April, phase 2 will implement a five month evaluation of the winning apps.
