Barbara Hubatkova was born in Prague, Czech Republic, during the period when it was governed under a Communist regime. When the Velvet Revolution occurred Barbara was 16. With new opportunities for business creation, she helped her mother open a dental lab which is still a family business today. Now, many years later, she and her daughter and husband live in Venice. Barbara says that her husband Paul tried for 23 years to get a green card, but it was only after they had purchased a vacation house here that they finally won the Diversity Green Card Lottery and became eligible to stay. This is a United States program that makes 55,000 green cards available to under-represented countries. Barbara and Paul have jobs and have established new lives

While still in Prague, Barbara learned some English from movies and American music. She says that subtitles were very helpful. With Paul's help, she learned to speak and understand basic English, but her pronuncia-Her daughter Kate tion was a problem. encouraged her to get help to improve it. Barbara began studying English at Suncoast Technical College, but realized that she needed one-on-one coaching and more opportunity to speak. She turned to LVSSC and was referred to Joe Pokorney, tutor and board member of the organization. Joe was delighted, especially since he has family roots in Czech Republic and he has visited there. Barbara made it clear that pronunciation improvement was her primary goal, but it became clear that she also needed some assistance with every day activities of life in this new culture.

Joe and Barbara meet once a week for an hour and a half. They spend part of the time discussing recent events and the basics of

navigating the cultural and civic norms of living in Florida and the United States. Barbara regularly turns to Joe for advice on many different issues. In doing this she is also getting lots of practice with vocabulary, sentence structure and verb tenses.

The second part of their session is devoted to Barbara's reading the first page of the Sunday New York Times. She regularly reads complex political stories and news reports. Joe assists her with pronunciation and encourages her to discuss the story to be certain she understands the content. Barbara does understand what she reads and has become quite comfortable discussing it.

Barbara states that 2 years ago, she did not speak English. Now she runs the household, contracting for services to make renovations to her home, dealing with utilities providers, internet phone service and the school system. Because Paul is away on business much of the time, Barbara had to become confident and effective very quickly. About 6 months ago, Barbara got a job at the YMCA teaching Spinning, a vigorous indoor cycling workout.



Dear LitWits...

Question: How can I make learning English more fun and interesting by personalizing the lesson?

Answer: Story telling may be a good answer. The student suggests the topic. As the student and tutor create the story, each adds a sentence that logically follows the previous sentence. The story is written by the tutor unless the student is on a high enough level to write it down; in this case the tutor can also evaluate the student's spelling. When the tutor and student create a story together, several things happen.

- The story reflects the interests of the student.
- The student uses the learned vocabulary and hopefully adds to it.
- As the student and tutor collaborate on the story, both can evaluate the student's use
 of vocabulary, tense, sentence structure and comprehension.
- There is an opportunity for the tutor to challenge the student by adding new tenses, vocabulary, irregular verbs, as well as pronunciation exercises.

The end-product is a document that is of interest to the student and contains many of the elements of language learning that each can appreciate.

In the same vein, the tutor can assign a film to watch that is of interest to the student. The tutor must have specific questions to elicit discussion that focuses on comprehension, vocabulary and tense.

Making the Most of ESL Teaching Aids Workshop

A gathering of nineteen LVSSC tutors was held at North Port Library on Tuesday, Jan. 17. Kathie Page, long time experienced tutor, presented a Roundtable Workshop of ways to "mix up" your tutor sessions and "make tutoring fun." Tutors in attendance work with students from different levels, and quickly discovered they could adapt all items presented to their particular student.

Kathie brought her student, Maria, along since she has used all of the games/handouts in their tutoring sessions. It was nice for tutors to talk with Maria and hear how she enjoyed these types of activities.





Kathie and Maria demonstrated some of the teaching aids and tutors tried out a few. There were fifteen handouts for tutors to include in sessions to make them more interesting along with a list of websites for tutors to check out. You could hear tutors saying "I like this one and will use it next week." Or "I can see how I can use this with my student at his/her level."

Student Success Stories - We'd Like to Print Yours


Irina, a physician from Russia, recently passed her second set of medical boards. This is a huge hurdle behind her on the way to becoming a doctor in this country. She was very worried about the results yet passed with scores that she described as "better than ok."

This was accomplished by many, many focused hours of study. But, as a radiologist from Moscow, she knows her medicine, so a greater hurdle will be her next exam which is oral. This will require patient interaction and demonstration of easy communication with patients while applying the skills of assessment, diagnosis and treatment.

She's more advanced than many in reading and writing, but needs practice with conversation. We're following scripts practicing doctor patient discussions. By coincidence, I have a close friend who has a part time gig as an actor in a medical school. So she's given us some very practical advice. Irina is currently working in the offices of two different medical doctors while continuing to study for her oral boards. She recently moved to the east coast with her husband, and we continue conversations using Skype or FaceTime. This is fun!

New Books in Venice, and in North Port too



With grant funds from the Gulf Coast Community Foundation, LVSSC purchased five new book titles from New Readers Press (NRP), along with some replacements, for the Venice Literacy Library.

Health Stories is a reader series comprised of three levels of student books -- introductory, low beginning and high beginning. The very short stories range from Levels .05 to low Level 2, and the exercises are appropriate for those levels -- and all three books introduce students to health care issues and health verbiage. These books are in the "Stories and Reading" section.

Building a Strong Vocabulary is another three-level series with individual books aimed at vocabulary for life skills, work readiness and preparation for academic study. Many NRP books are lower level, but this series is not. These are serious vocabulary books, suitable for Level 2.5 and higher. They are housed in the "Vocabulary" section.

LifePrints and That's Life are both series books, ranging from Level 0 to Level 3. These are multi-purpose books that include reading, comprehension, vocabulary, writing, grammar and opportunity for conversation. For tutors who have found Challenger, Endeavor and even Voyager a bit too difficult for their students, these books might be the ticket. LifePrints also has related workbooks you can borrow; That's Life does not come with workbooks.


More Stories Plus and More Easy Stories Plus are replacements for books that were lost due to water damage. They are easy readers for students at Level 0.5 through 1.5 and are housed in the "Stories and Reading" section.

These are not modern or new books, but they do allow low level students to actually use readers and try reading comprehension exercises.

A financial literacy book, *Control Your Money*, is written for learners at Level 2.5 (strong intermediate) and above about the importance of managing, saving, spending and investing money. It is housed in the "Workplace/Community" section. This book is for tutors who work with higher level students and want a comprehensive financial resource to help students learn about managing money in America.

New in both the Venice and North Port literacy libraries is 4,000 Essential English Words, a six-book vocabulary series written by renown EFL teacher Paul Nation. Both libraries have Books 1, 2 and 3 only. Paul Nation is a proponent of teaching language learners English vocabulary that is most frequently heard, read and encountered in daily life, instead of teaching academic or infrequently heard words. The goal, of course, is for students to build a working vocabulary for daily use and to understand most of what they hear and read. As you would expect, the words in the series get progressively harder as the book numbers increase. The books in both libraries are the easiest three books in the series. All of these books have exercises that are easy for tutors to replicate and build for more practice.





Class Memories

In the Advanced English Conversation class the students met with their teachers Maureen Keyes and Ron Taylor for the last time. Since this would be their last meeting, Maureen asked if they would help her write a short report about their time together.

Maureen suggested that the students each respond to prompt: **I will always remember...** Thus began the story.

Baha recently arrived in the U.S. and wanted to learn to speak English, not only for himself but also to help his step-father. He wanted to become a good example because his step-father has not learned much English during the five years he has lived in North Port.

Alex will always remember the interesting words that he learned, and how funny Ron's movie *The Gypsy Yodeler* was and how much it made him laugh.

Our guest *Halyna* moved to the United States about 60 years ago from the anti-religious regime in Ukraine. She will always remember how well everyone spoke English. She was offered encouragement from everyone. She will remain grateful for the opportunity to live in the US and learn to speak English because it helped her believe in God.

Mary will remember many things but most importantly the friends that she has made over the years while learning to speak English. She will always remember the nice people that volunteered to teach her. She is most appreciative.

Vladimir will always remember how much the teachers have helped him learn English. He told of a rather harrowing tale about an encounter with a small American shark that swam near him.
