Literacy is the Answer!

A common goal of our learners is to master enough English to be able to get a good job. With the help of their LVSSC tutors, a married couple from Russia have both seen that dream come true in less than a year!

Some of you will remember that Alina and Filipp spoke at the Volunteer Appreciation Lunch in April 2024. They moved to the US in September 2023 from St. Petersburg, Russia, along with their 8-year-old daughter Alesia, and now live in Englewood with Filipp's parents. Shortly after they arrived, Filipp's stepfather took them to the Venice Library to register with Peter Normann for LVSSC tutoring services.

Carolyn Pearce selected Alina as her learner and they began meeting weekly in October 2023, "Alina was very motivated," recalled Carolyn. "She had a master's degree from Russia and had worked as an economist for 10 years before moving to the US."

Since Alina had a young daughter, Carolyn started bringing children's books to use in their tutoring sessions. She found them at Ollie's Bargain Outlet in Venice for as little as \$1.50 each. One learning that stood out to Carolyn from the LVSSC Tutor Training class was the TEDx Talk video "Literacy is the Answer" with speaker John Trischitti. "He said that reading is the foundation upon which all other essential skills are built, and that the greatest impact is from a child's access to books." He recommended that children have access at home to at least the same number of books as their age. So, as they finished each book, Alina took it home with instructions to read it to Alesia. Alesia now has a thirty-book children's library, ranging from Mickey Saves the Day to My Illustrated Classics Collection!

Another part of each weekly tutoring session was reviewing idioms from the book 101 American English Idioms, which was recommended in Dell's monthly Tutor Chats. And when they met for the last time in November 2024, Carolyn presented Alina with her own copy of this book!

Carolyn and Alina investigated volunteer opportunities for Alina so she could practice speaking English. Starting in February 2024, Alina began volunteering weekly at the Twig warehouse in Venice, sorting children's clothing. (Twig is a local organization serving children in foster care.) Alina enjoyed talking with the other volunteers while they worked and even used Twig's volunteer coordinator as a reference when she applied for jobs.

Learning English is an exciting adventure, but it can also come with its challenges. To make the most of your studies, consider supplementing your lessons with an online English program that offers personalized support.

Peter Norrman, our Coordinator in the Venice Library, hosts and is a moderator for the ***Student Chat*** every Monday at noon. ***Student Chats*** are also available on Thursday evenings at 6:00 PM hosted by Volunteer ***Kim Pike***. This is the perfect opportunity for students to practice speaking English with other students and tutors.

Prior to each ***Student Chat***, our Tutor/Teacher ***Barbara Robidoux*** prepares the lesson for the day. Students and Tutors will discuss stories from ***News for You Online***, an online newspaper. The link is: <http://NewsForYouOnline.com> Students may use this free web site any time. The password is 737619.

There are usually 4 or 5 tutors and from 4 to 12 students in each ***Student Chat***. Students typically do all the reading. Tutors help with pronunciation and interpretations. They talk about the newspaper articles in ***News for You Online***. If a student wants to join the ***Chat*** and listen and not talk, that is okay. Listening is also a part of learning English. This is a perfect way to practice speaking English with other people.

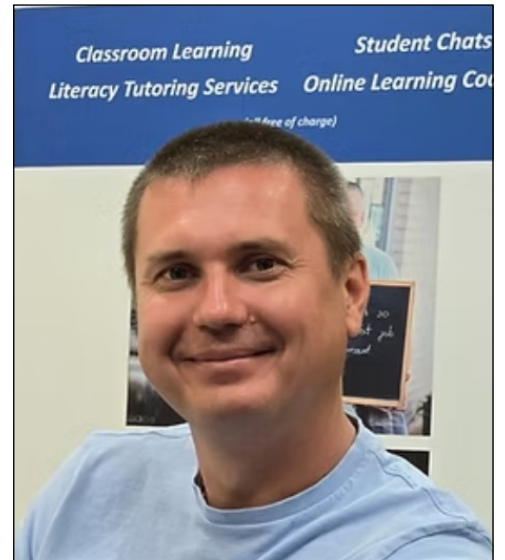

My name is Serhii. I'm from Ukraine and This is My Story.

I often thought exploring other cultures, living another life, and trying something new would be great. My curiosity for other places in the world is probably because I am someone who always moves forward. Life is short. As my dream developed over many years, my choice of where to experience a different culture was here in the United States.

I have always been impressed with your country because it has so many possibilities, laws that work, the best economy in the world, and a wide diversity of people. I can list the advantages endlessly. Only here will you not be just an immigrant....if you work hard, you can become an important part of this society and become one more person that finds that the American dream is real. It can happen. It's a story that people from all over the world have heard about.



I started to explore how to achieve my dream by participating in the Diversity Visa (DV) immigrant visa program (Green Card Lottery) and I got lucky, I won! But winning this lottery doesn't mean you get handed a visa. After winning, I had to fill out a lot of documentation and wait for an interview at the U.S. Embassy in Kiev, Ukraine. And because COVID-19 was in the world that year (2021), the embassy staff that processed cases was eventually reduced and there were lots of delays.

By August 2021 after weeks of delays, I almost lost hope of getting an invitation to the interview because the last day of interviewing was 30 September. And suddenly on 30 August, I received an email with the appointment on 3 September. After that, I passed a medical examination and was interviewed. Soon after the interview, my DV visa was approved.

During all this waiting time, I explored what states would be good for my living. My two top choices were Florida and California, because I wanted to live in a warm climate and be close to the ocean. After I found out how expensive it was to live in California, I began looking for a city in Florida that was close to the ocean. Originally, I wanted to live in Miami, but rising prices for rent made me change my mind. Instead, I decided to live in North Port, where I had some friends.

On 12 February 2022, I went to the airport in Ukraine to come to the United States. When I arrived, I was told that my flight was canceled due to bad weather. So, the airport staff found another flight. It would go to Turkey and then land in Miami. This change totally confused my schedule and travel plans, but I found out later that the cause of the cancellation of so many flights leaving Ukraine that day was not bad weather, but the upcoming WAR. Four days later all foreign airlines canceled flights to Ukraine.

I was happy that I was finally here in North Port, even though I was starting my life over from scratch. I found a job at the PGT company as a team member working on the factory floor. It was not easy, especially after having been a project manager and engineer in Ukraine. Along the way, I started learning English at the North Port Library. I attended ESL 2 English classes, and later I started to attend ESL Level 2 and Level 4 English classes. In the process of studying English, Karen, who is the program coordinator, found a personal tutor, John, for me. Later I met my current tutor, Mike, who has also become a mentor to me as I adjust to life in America.

I'm very grateful to LVSSC for giving me opportunities to learn and improve my English. In February 2024, I got a part-time job as Staff Assistant for LVSSC. I am very happy to be a part of their team. I will work hard to make this organization more successful because I know how Literacy Volunteers helps immigrants improve their lives. That means a lot to me!

I have lived in the United States in the state of Florida for six years. I passed the citizenship test and now proudly live here as a citizen. Moving to a new country at the age of 48 with my husband and 9-year-old daughter was far from easy, especially without knowing English. You could say we started from scratch—finding jobs, studying, and building friendships because we couldn't imagine life without meaningful connections.

I deeply love the country where I was born and where all my relatives live, but now I can say that I have truly fallen in love with sunny Florida. The beautiful Gulf of Mexico, mild winters, lush greenery, and rich wildlife have all captured my heart, even though at first everything felt unfamiliar and foreign.

It would be unfair to call this journey my achievement alone. My beloved husband and daughters are my true friends and strong supporters. I am also incredibly grateful to the kind and attentive teachers who guided me through the process of learning the language and preparing for the citizenship exam, a process that took almost a year of dedication. These teachers not only supported my studies but also helped me overcome life's difficulties by pointing me to the right resources when I needed them most.

Over these six years, the world has faced many challenges. The COVID-19 pandemic brought immense hardship and loss.

The ongoing war between Russia and Ukraine has left its mark on the entire globe. Florida, too, has endured several devastating hurricanes, with communities constantly working to rebuild. And yet, amidst it all, so much good continues to happen in people's lives.

It's difficult to say where I feel most at home now. I have an interesting job, but I still long for deeper social connections. While I've grown much better at understanding native English speakers, there is still so much more to learn and explore.

Student Success Story - Congratulations to Mariia!



Mariia moved to the U.S. from Ukraine in 2017 with her husband and four children. I began working with Mariia in June 2022, and we have been meeting twice a week at the North Port Library since that date.

While working on improving her English, Mariia decided to get her citizenship, so we began studying in earnest during 2023. She studied very hard for the test, and it took a full year from the time she applied for citizenship to the time they called her in for an interview. On September 19, 2024, Mariia passed the test and became a U.S. Citizen! Mariia stated, "I was relieved to pass the citizenship test, and it is a day I will never forget!" I would like to add that her husband and oldest son also became U.S. Citizens in the same year, but I was not their tutor.

Mariia now has five children ranging in age from 20 to 6 years old. She continues to put forth hard work in her lessons as she works to improve her English. I am so proud of her accomplishments.

Thank You to Heron Creek Community Foundation in North Port!

Last month a select group of nonprofits that serve North Port attended an awards celebration at the Heron Creek Golf and Country Club. This master-planned community of just over 950 homes has a long-established Charitable Foundation, that raises contributions from their homeowners. In 2024, this amount reached a record \$103,420!

Literacy Volunteers were among the recipients.



The funds we were awarded will be used to purchase books and other training materials for our North Port-based students. Of the almost 460 students we served over the last year, some 60% reside in North Port.

We are grateful for the generosity of Heron Creek residents. Their gift will help us meet the exploding demand we are experiencing for our services, and help us keep pace with the growth North Port is now experiencing. It is now the 2nd fastest growing city in the United States and is now three times the size of neighboring Venice.

Tutor Mentoring Program / Tutor Chats

I spearheaded the creation of our **Tutor Mentoring Program** over two years ago. I wanted to ensure that our tutors felt supported and valued once their Tutor Training Class was completed. There are times when a Tutor needs a bit more encouragement, especially if the Tutor did not come from a teaching background, as most do not. I meet individually with a Tutor on Zoom, or meet in person, where we can discuss lessons, workbooks, attendance problems, and a host of other issues that may arise. This program helps build a strong sense of community. Tutors need to know they are not out there alone!



Our monthly **Tutor Chats** evolved as an extension of the **Tutor Mentoring Program**. These gatherings are more than just meetings—they are a space for open dialogue, sharing ideas, answering questions and celebrating the successes of our tutors and learners. Who doesn't like telling others how proud they are of their student or how they handled a situation? It's an opportunity for us to come together, brag a little, share experiences, and continue to build the supportive network that is so vital to tutor retention.

My **Co-Host, Rich Ames**, became a Tutor in November 2023. Together, we offer support, encouragement and a few new ideas to our tutors each month, and attendees discuss their tutoring experiences, problems, and solutions. Carolyn was involved in the recruiting process at Procter & Gamble, so she and Alina worked together to develop Alina's resume and conduct practice interviews. When Alina finally received her social security card in May she started applying to positions, and in October 2024, Alina started work in an administrative position with the Sarasota County school system.

Alina shares her experience in the LVSSC tutoring relationship: "Thanks to Carolyn I have become more confident in speaking English. Her experience in corporate culture provided me with many nuances and valuable information for job interviews and job hunting. Additionally, her invitation to new tutors to join our sessions offered extra, interesting practice in conversing with new people and highlighted the importance of building a network. I started my journey with Carolyn during a challenging period when my husband was in another state, and it was emotionally tough being in a new country. Despite the hardships, I had to stay strong for our daughter. Carolyn made a great effort and significantly helped me through this difficult time."

When Carolyn helped teach the LVSSC Tutor Training class in January 2024, one student was Ray Szczepanski, an experienced tutor whose learner had recently moved on. Since Filipp had not yet been assigned a tutor, Ray requested him as a learner at Carolyn's suggestion.

"Filipp is a quick learner and a smart guy," Ray reports. "He was also really motivated." In college Ray took a course in Russian literature, and Filipp had a lifetime of exposure to Russian authors such as Leo Tolstoy. Ray leveraged that commonality and used literature as a tool in their twice-weekly tutoring sessions.

Ray also used vocabulary, puzzles and grammar lessons in his tutoring arsenal, and at Filipp's request they used flashcards on verb tenses. "My biggest challenge was answering his grammar questions!" Ray exclaimed.

Filipp studied English in high school and college, so helping him gain confidence while speaking English was a priority. Ray encouraged Filipp to word things differently if he could not remember a specific word, and their time spent in conversation increased from one third of the session to almost all their time together.

Filipp said "Ray surprised me with his knowledge and intelligence. Despite not being a professional teacher, his approach to tutoring was very professional. I am glad Ray chose me as his learner; our conversations were open and interesting, with a few 'manly' jokes thrown in." Filipp was particularly impressed by Ray's diverse teaching methods.

Filipp was a network engineer in Russia, but early in his career he wired buildings for computer networks. Since computer wiring and electrical wiring are similar skills, Filipp was able to find work here as an electrician. He would like to work again as a full-fledged engineer and is taking courses now to get the software certifications needed.

Likewise, Alina is studying online to get certified in financial software packages so she can eventually move back into her field. In the meantime, with the help of their tutors, Alina and Filipp met their goals of finding full-time employment.

Carolyn and Ray encourage LVSSC tutors to establish a good rapport with their learners, meeting them where they are in life and serving as a friend and mentor in addition to being their tutor!
